

SOCS Symposium Summary – March 2016

The Skin of Color Society (SOCS) hosted its **12th Annual Scientific Symposium** on Thursday, March 3, 2016, at the Washington, DC, Marriott Marquis. The day began with the General Business Meeting and the President's Report by Dr. Amy McMichael and was followed by a full program of speakers. The President's report included statistics on increased membership for the Society. Several major accomplishments of the Society in the past year were celebrated, including:

- 1) An update on the resounding success of the inaugural SOCS Media Day which was held in December 2015
- 2) An announcement of Valeant's continued funding of our research grant program as well as an acknowledgement of our corporate sponsors and the Society's gratitude for their participation
- 3) An update on our social media, website and public outreach initiatives
- 4) An announcement of the Inaugural Skin of Color Society International Networking & Scientific Session to be held in April 2016 in New Delhi, India

SOCS committees reported on their activity over the past year. Exciting new initiatives were discussed, some of which included: growth of our membership numbers, continued activity of the mentorship program, the appointment of Dr. Sarkar as chair of the International & National Committee, Scientific Committee reported a record number (20) of abstracts submitted, and continued efforts by our technology committee to ensure search engine optimization of our website to increase traffic from the public.

Outgoing officers and committee members were thanked for their service and the new slate of officers was presented and accepted. In addition, Dr. Amy McMichael will continue as President, and Dr. Seemal R. Desai will continue as Secretary/Treasurer.

- 2. Ginette A. Okoye, MD, Director, Ethnic Skin Program, Assistant Professor Department of Dermatology Johns Hopkins School of Medicine, spoke on Cutaneous T-Cell Lymphoma the title of her talk was *Cutaneous T-cell Lymphomas/Mycosis Fungoides in African Americans*
- 3. Amit G. Pandya, MD, Professor of Dermatology, University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center, ended the program by speaking on diversity in dermatology, the title of his talk was *Diversity in Dermatology: A Call to Action*
